CPD and the City of Chicago continue to experience resource restrictions that limit our ability to implement vital policing reform initiatives needed to respond to our pressing public safety challenges, which include significant increases in shootings and murders and reduced community trust in the police. It is well known and has been widely reported that although CPD had implemented comprehensive crime reduction strategies that reduced overall index crime through 2015, Chicago had the largest murder increase in 2016 of any 'large American city' in the last 25 years. In fact, according to an updated analysis by the Brennan Center for Justice, more than half (55.1%) of the country's 2016 urban homicide rate increase was attributed to Chicago alone. While other large cities driving that increase (e.g. Baltimore; Washington, D.C.) significantly decreased their murders and shootings in 2016, the number of murders and shootings in Chicago skyrocketed throughout all of 2016, and it was reported Chicago had more murders in 2016 (760) than did any of the nation's largest cities, and greater than New York and Los Angeles combined. Chicago's violent crime upsurge has continued to date, although to a lesser degree in recent months, perhaps in part because of the City's costly expenditures for technology (i.e. deployment of Shot Spotter in 13 of 22 police districts) and massive policing overtime strategies. The consequence of this ongoing fiscal distress? Even as the City has strived to creatively reduce costs and achieve operational efficiencies, ongoing resource limitations continue to stifle CPD's development and implementation of new and much needed policing strategies. Beyond the impact of the above-noted recent expenditures it should be noted that year after year, 93% of CPD's budget has been allocated to personnel costs, leaving very little for all other policing costs, requiring CPD to rely extensively on federal grant funding for most all research and development initiatives. However, this ongoing fiscal stress has encouraged innovation and new ideas on how policing can operate more efficiently and effectively - and just such an important idea has emerged that CPD cannot develop and implement without federal funding support as requested in the current application. CPD and its local and national partners have been working for months to develop technology and training concepts to measurably enhance the ability of our nearly 1,200 sergeants (CPD's first-line supervisors) to better supervise the 10,000 officers under their command by detecting early warning signs that an officer's performance, especially when interacting with the public, is at risk of worsening - and to intervene with that officer to validate those possible concerns and proactively link that officer to needed services. The technology side of this initiative is being handled separately; the current funding opportunity will allow CPD and partners to develop and implement a "Next-Gen" Sergeant Early Intervention System (EIS) Training Program. Quite simply, this important initiative cannot be initiated and completed without federal support through the FY 2018 COPS Community Policing Development grant program. The federal support requested by CPD's current proposal will allow us to connect national and local expertise, including members of a National EIS Advisory Team, to make available to our sergeants the data, skills and insights they need to identify officers in need of assistance in order to provide them with the support and/or training they need to be at their best, and to consistently demonstrate policing legitimacy while abiding by procedural justice principles when serving and interacting with the community. We believe this approach will help us reverse current downward officer morale and violent crime trend lines while simultaneously improving community trust in, and partnership with the Chicago Police Department in co-producing public safety in Chicago.

First-line supervisors (Sergeants) are the core of community-focused policing. As leaders within the Chicago Police Department (CPD), they set the tone for their officers' interactions with community members; and as leaders within the community, they serve as the face of the Department when community members are most distressed. Under the proposed Sergeant Early Intervention System (EIS) Training Project, CPD, in partnership with the University of Chicago Crime Lab and a team of police experts from across the country who comprise the EIS National Advisory Committee (NAC), will develop and test sergeant training aimed at enhancing the knowledge and skills of officers and agencies to ensure the highest level of first-line supervision. The training developed as a result of this work will both teach sergeants to employ new EIS technology in their day-to-day work, and improve sergeants' mentorship and leadership skills to help them successfully use this tool to engage with their direct reports and the communities they serve. Los Angeles Police Department Assistant Chief Sandy Jo MacArthur (ret.) will lead the development and testing of the proposed first-line supervisory training alongside a subcommittee of relevant subject matter experts from the NAC, the UChicago Crime Lab, and CPD.




